Message from the Head of School

In early April I took advantage of one of the few warm days to take a walk on campus. My excuse was to check the school's woods for trout lilies and to see if the mallards had arrived on our property yet. I knew that our students had been watching for signs of them, and I was just as eager to find them as they scoped out their first nesting spot of the season. Honestly, though, I was also simply looking for a much-needed mental break from some now-forgotten mental task. As I

walked across the playground to the woods, I noticed that the second grade had also decided to come out for a break from their work and were playing along the edge of the woods.

"Hey, Ms. Lauer, want to see our village?" a second grader yelled. Before I knew it, I was touring a grand complex which was, according to my second grade guide, the site of their upcoming festival. There was a carefully constructed campfire rimmed with river rocks for cooking the imaginary food they would sell and an impressive pile of wood to fuel it. Further down the edge of the field was an area for "training" with logs for jumping over and paths for running on. Several trees had been scoped out as markers for living areas. Everyone in

the class was busy carving out this world that fifteen minutes before had only been a thought.

Ms. Leavy had brought her class outside to take an afternoon recess break because she, like all good teachers, knows that the best way to improve class performance and heighten directed attention is to get kids out of the class and into fresh air and nature where their involuntary attention can take over and give their brains a recharging. Countless studies, from those at Albert Einstein College of Medicine to researchers reporting in The Journal of School Health at Harvard University, have supported the fact that unstructured play, or recess as schools call it, is a vital component of academic success.

In addition to improving academic achievement, the opportunity for free play, unguided by adults, is also crucial to a

child's social development. Everyone acknowledges that this is true in early childhood. We all recognize that "play with a purpose" is part of the pre-school world, where teachers use play to guide children from parallel play to cooperative play and to then develop creativity and readiness for math and literacy. But the purpose of play follows children into the grades, and the forms it takes serve not only academic but also vital social roles. When kids play, they learn and practice social cues, they

learn how to bargain and cooperate, and they gain resiliency. When the second graders invited me to see what they were doing, they clearly did not see their work as play. With no instructions or guidance from their teacher, they had decided on a goal, chosen roles and worked feverishly as a group to accomplish that goal before they had to go back inside to their classwork. What wasn't finished remained tucked in the backs of their minds for completion at the next opportunity...and I can assure you that it was work that they looked forward to doing.

Last spring a mallard laid her clutch of eggs right under the slide, and it became an outdoor science center until the June day when the eggs hatched and the duck led her chicks to the brook. If she returns this spring, daily observation of her nest will simply fit into the many other games, building projects, swinging and chatting that make up the crucial business of outdoor play.

When our school was founded in 1917, its fresh air philosophy was based on intuition, without the benefit of brain scans and research that now link free play to academic and social success. How wonderful it is that ninety two years later we have concrete support for getting outside and running around!

Celebrating Earth Day at Unquowa



Unquowa celebrated Earth Day on April 17 with presentations and activities throughout the day. Lower School's day started with a presentation by the Audubon Center and some of Connecticut's native animals. Students learned that the Albino Corn Snake they met has a hard time surviving because it can't find an environment where it can blend in. In contrast, the Painted Turtle, another Connecticut native, has adapted well to its environment. Students also got a chance to meet an Asian Red Eared Spider, a species that is not native to the area. This led to a discussion about buying exotic pets and not knowing how to care for them. The Garbage Museum discussed reducing, recycling, and vermicomposting. Students participated in a sorting activity separating trash from recyclable objects.

After lunch with their Upper School partner, some students spent time identifying native and invasive species on our campus, while others did a rate of flow investigation of the Horse Tavern Brook and London's Brook. Upper Schoolers also met some creatures that live at the Audubon Center — a Fire-bellied Toad, Yellow Spotted Turtle and a tarantula. They also met and listened to Colin Carlson, a 12 year old University of Connecticut student who has been an agent of change in his home town of Coventry. His passion for the environment and the small steps everyone can take to make a difference left a lasting impression.

In the afternoon, Grades 5, 6, 7, and 8 made the earth a better place by going to Jennings Beach and picking up enough litter to fill 20 bags of garbage from the dunes that surround the beach. Earth Day 2009 at Unquowa was a day for learning about and caring for the environment in an active, fun-filled way.


